



CLARK COUNTY SHOOTING PARK INFORMATION SHEET

TIMELINE

- 1984: A local citizens group identifies the current CCSP site on the North end of Decatur Blvd as a preferred site and begins negotiations with BLM to build a public shooting range.
- 1996: An Off-duty Metro Police Officer, dirt biking in the desert, is accidentally shot by a target shooter. This incident prompts public demands for public shooting range.
- 1996: The City of Las Vegas Parks Planning Commission recommends current site on North Decatur as the preferred location to build a public shooting range and begins a series of public meetings.
- 2000: The City of Las Vegas appoints a citizen action team to begin planning and developing the range site.
- 2000: The Clark County Board of County Commissioners directs County officials to review the development of a shooting park based on public input.
- 2000: The Clark County Commission accepts staff recommendation on a site location for a shooting park.
- 2001: An NRA Range Technical Team evaluates the current CCSP site.
- 2001: The Nevada Legislature passes a resolution requesting a public shooting range at the chosen site.
- 2001: The City of Las Vegas, City of North Las Vegas, City of Henderson, and the Nevada Legislature all pass resolutions in support of a public shooting range at the chosen site.
- 2001: Various environmental studies of the site are completed. No endangered species are found and the site is cleared for acquisition as a public shooting range.
- 2002: National legislation is introduced to transfer 2,900 acres of BLM land to Clark County for exclusive use as a shooting park.
- 2002: The Clark County Board of County Commission appoints the 30-member Shooting Park Advisory Committee.
- 2002-Present: Public meetings are held monthly to plan, design, operate and manage the site. Any action regarding planning, grant proposals, grant acceptance and other agreements are all approved in noticed public hearings in front of Clark County Board of County Commissioners.
- 2003: The 2,900 acres of land is formally transferred from federal government to Clark County for exclusive purpose to develop a shooting park.
- 2003: The Advisory Committee completes a conceptual master plan of the Park.



- 2004: The Advisory Committee completes Business/Financial and Marketing Plans for the Park.
- 2004: SNPLMA Grant (Round 3) for \$500,000 is awarded to CCSP for pre-engineering and cost estimates.
- 2005: The Shooting Park Manager is hired with funds from a Nevada Department of Wildlife grant.
- 2005: SNPLMA Grant (Round 5) for \$15.8 million is awarded to CCSP for use in designing and building the Public Module infrastructure.
- 2005: The land acquired for CCSP is formally rezoned from “Rural” to “Public Facility” after public hearings are held.
- 2005: The County Commission approves Poggemeyer Design Group for the professional engineering services on the Shooting Park.
- 2005: The County Commission receives a pre-design report on the Shooting Park.
- 2006: SNPLMA Grant (Round 6) for \$42 million is awarded to CCSP for use in building the CCSP Public Module facilities.
- 2006: The County Commission approves a contract with Orth-Rodgers & Associates for engineering services on the Shooting Park.
- 2007: The CCSP Financial Management Plan is completed.
- 2007: The Nevada Legislature passes a law allowing for the sale of naming rights to the Shooting Park for capital development.
- 2007: The County Commission authorizes the creation of a Public Information Specialist for the Shooting Park.
- 2007: The County Commission receives a report on the progress of the Shooting Park.
- 2007: The County Commission approves a \$500,000 grant from the Las Vegas Convention and Visitors Authority for use in the design of the Shooting Park Tourism Center.

LOOKING TOWARDS THE FUTURE

This project has enjoyed tremendous support from citizens and all levels of government. When fully completed the Shooting Park will provide a full-service venue for all shooting disciplines and will provide the public with a safe place to use their firearms and archery equipment. The Events & Service Modules will be constructed as funds become available.

Besides providing a quality site for our citizens, it's size and management will ensure that the Shooting Park will be self-sufficient once it is fully operational. This was a management objective established by the County Commission. The shooting park will have 22 buildings containing approximately 100,000 square feet of usable space. Classrooms, meeting areas, and the ranges are designed to rent to various events and groups. The majority of the completed shooting park will be for use on a fee basis.



PUBLIC MODULE

The target completion date for Phase 1, the Public Module, is June 2009. This module is designed to provide immediate public shooting opportunities to the citizens of Clark County. The Public Module consists of the development of the following features on 178 acres of the site:

- Access Roadway: The roadway to access the park will be one mile of Decatur Blvd beginning at the Iron Mountain sub station and continue North to the park site. This roadway includes a box culvert, water, electrical and phone conduits, fencing, and retaining walls.
- Internal Roadway: CCSP will contain approximately 3 miles of internal paved roadway.
- Water System: The water system at CCSP consists of an approximately two-mile long water line with a pump station from the City of North Las Vegas Reservoir at Moccasin Road and Decatur Blvd. This pump station services the 55,000-gallon reservoir located at the Northeast corner of the property and all the water lines for the public module.
- Park Entrance: The entrance to the park will contain a traffic circle, esthetic monuments, and two electric access gates.
- Park Office: The CCSP Park Office will be a 2,000 square foot building where CCSP Staff offices will be located. It will also contain an area reserved for public parking.
- Maintenance Area: This is a reserved 12,000 square foot area for a maintenance building and secure compound.
- Host Site: The Host Site will consist of a 30-site, full service area for the CCSP Host Program.
- Archery Center: The Archery Center will house a known-distance archery range, covered firing points, and shade ramadas.
- Shotgun Center: This feature contains 24 combination Trap and Skeet fields, a 5,443 square foot shotgun center with a reception area, a pro shop, shotgun storage lockers and a cafeteria. It will also feature 90 full-service RV sites, a clay target storage building, lit ranges and shade ramadas.
- Public Rifle/Pistol Center: The Public Rifle/Pistol Center will offer 30 shooting points up to 50 yards; 15 shooting points up to 200 yards; 15 points up to 100 yards, night lights, shade ramadas, concrete shooting tables, covered shooting areas, a 3,000 square foot building with a convenience store, a reception area, a 30 seat classroom, restrooms and a pro shop.
- Hunter Education Center: This 4,400 square foot building will contain three 30-seat classrooms expandable up to one 90-seat classroom, two offices for NDOW use, and restrooms. It will also feature night lighting, a 100-meter archery range with 10 positions, a 100-yard range with 10 positions, and a 50-yard range with 20 positions. It will also contain a shotgun range and two walking field courses.



EVENTS MODULE

The Events Module is designed to provide ranges for competitive events. These events could be local markets, sectional, regional, national and international markets. Completion of this module is based on funding.

- Sporting Clay Courses (4): The four clay courses will include a 200-car parking lot and two prefabricated restrooms.
- Tourist Ranges (2): These two ranges will provide an opportunity for destination tourist to visit the shooting park for themed shoots. Safety instructions and supervision will be provided in the language appropriate to the visitor. The Tourist Ranges will have a 1,500 square foot building, night lighting, covered firing points, a BBQ/eating area, and a parking lot designed to accommodate tourist buses.
- Tactical Ranges (30): The 30 Tactical Ranges will be 50-feet wide and 50 yards long. This area will be equipped with a 1,500-foot classroom/restroom combination building for every 10 ranges, shade ramadas for every two ranges, parking lots and night lightning.
- 50 Yard Range: This 100 position range has a 1,500 foot classroom/restroom combination building, covered firing points, sidewalks, turning and moving targets, a parking lot and night lighting.
- 100 Meter Range: This 100 position range has a 1,500-foot classroom/restroom combination building, a parking lot and night lightning.
- Pistol Silhouette Range: This range is designed for 10 banks of animals. The longest distance is 200 meters. The range will also feature a 1,500-foot classroom/restroom combination building, a parking lot, and covered firing points.
- Rifle Silhouette Range: This range is designed for 10 banks of animals with the longest distance at 500 meters. It will also feature a 1,500-foot classroom/restroom combination building, a parking lot, and covered firing points.
- 500 Yard Range: This range has 75 points, concrete shooting tables, a reloading building, covered firing points, a shade ramada, and has a 1,500 foot classroom/restroom combination building. It will also include 30 full-service RV hook-up sites.
- 1,200 Yard Range: This range has 150 firing positions with shooting distances at 1,200, 1,000, 900, 800, 600, 500, 200 and 100 yards. It has a 1,500-foot classroom/restroom combination building, restrooms, and storage bays in the "rifle pit" area.
- Mounted Shooting Arena: This range is specifically designed for mounted shooting horse events. This area will feature an RV camping area, horse corral, viewing stand, water troughs, bleachers and night lighting.
- Storage Area: The storage area is designed to allow event managers a secure place to store event trailers.



- Spectator Parking: A 1,000-car parking lot is featured at CCSP and will be used by spectators who will be shuttled to the various events.
- International Trap Bunkers (3): Designed for international traps, these bunkers include shade ramadas and night lightning.
- Trap Fields (101): These standard trap fields will have shade ramadas for every two fields. Every group of 24 will feature a 1,500-foot classroom/restroom combination building. These ranges also include 405 full service RV hook-up sites.
- Archery Field Courses (4): These four field courses will also include prefabricated restrooms.
- FITA Archery Range: This 90 meter international archery range will provide 100 shooting positions.

SERVICE MODULE

The Service Module is the final phase of the project. It will provide the remaining features necessary to offer a full range of services at the Clark County Shooting Park. Completion based on funding.

- Campground: The campground will offer 100 full-service RV hook-up sites with showers, restrooms and laundry. All will be maintained per County standards.
- Park Center: The Park Center is designed as the center of activities for the Shooting Park. This building will include a reception area, pro shop, a restaurant, meeting rooms and an indoor range, which will include 20 rifle/pistol positions and 60 air gun positions.
- Security and Enforcement-Training Ranges: These ranges will include a 1,500 foot classroom/restroom combination building, two tactical ranges, a moving target range, a 500 yard sniper range, and a “shoot house” area. These will be built as the need for security and enforcement-training areas increase as the Las Vegas Valley expands in population.
